## ORDER INSTITUTING PROCEEDINGS PURSUANT TO SECTIONS 6(c) and 6(d) OF THE COMMODITY EXCHANGE ACT, MAKING FINDINGS AND IMPOSING REMEDIAL SANCTIONS

I.

The Commodity Futures Trading Commission ("Commission") has reason to believe that Huafu HK Co. Ltd. ("Huafu" or "Respondent") violated Commission Regulation ("Regulation") 19.02, 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016), periodically, from May 4, 2012 to June 5, 2015 (the "Relevant Period"). Therefore, the Commission deems it appropriate and in the public interest that public administrative proceedings be, and hereby are, instituted to determine whether Huafu engaged in the violations set forth herein and to determine whether any order should be issued imposing remedial sanctions.

II.

In anticipation of the institution of an administrative proceeding, Huafu has submitted an Offer of Settlement ("Offer"), which the Commission has determined to accept. Without admitting or denying any of the findings or conclusions herein, Huafu consents to the entry of this Order Instituting Proceedings Pursuant to Sections 6(c) and 6(d) of the Commodity Exchange Act, Making Findings and Imposing Remedial Sanctions ("Order"), and acknowledges service of this Order. <sup>1</sup>

Huafu consents to the entry of this Order and to the use of these findings in this proceeding and in any other proceeding brought by the Commission or to which the Commission is a party; provided, however, that Huafu does not consent to the use of the Offer, or the findings or conclusions in this Order consented to in the Offer, as the sole basis for any other proceeding brought by the Commission, other than in a proceeding in bankruptcy or to enforce the terms of this Order. Nor does Huafu consent to the use of the Offer or this Order, or the findings or conclusions in this Order consented to in the Offer, by any other party in any other proceeding.

The Commission finds the following:

### A. <u>SUMMARY</u>

Cotton merchants and dealers that hold or control reportable cotton futures positions under Regulation 15.00(p)(1)(i), 17 C.F.R. § 15.00(p)(1)(i) (2016), are required to file a CFTC Form 304 reporting their call cotton purchases and sales weekly as of the close of business on Friday, and no later than two business days following the date of the report pursuant to Regulations 19.00(a)(2) and 19.02, 17 C.F.R. §§ 19.00(a)(2) and 19.02 (2016). During the Relevant Period, Huafu failed to comply with this requirement.

### B. RESPONDENT

**Huafu HK Co. Ltd.**, based in Hong Kong, China is a corporation organized under the laws of Hong Kong, China. Huafu has never been registered with the Commission in any capacity.

## C. <u>FACTS</u>

Huafu is a cotton merchant or dealer. Whenever cotton merchants or dealers hold or control at least one hundred (100) cotton futures positions, they are required by Regulations to file weekly CFTC Form 304 reports with the Commission setting forth their call cotton purchases and sales as of the close of business Friday, and are required to submit their CFTC Form 304 reports within two business days. On approximately seventy-eight (78) occasions during the Relevant Period, Huafu held or controlled at least 100 cotton futures positions, but did not file CFTC Form 304 reports as required.

In accepting Huafu's Offer, the Commission recognizes Huafu's cooperation in this matter. After Huafu was contacted by the Commission regarding its failure to file Form 304 reports, Huafu committed to back file all approximately seventy-eight (78) of the CFTC Forms 304 that previously should have been filed with the Commission.

#### IV.

### **LEGAL DISCUSSION**

Pursuant to Regulation 19.00(a)(2), 17 C.F.R. § 19.00(a)(2) (2016), cotton merchants and dealers that hold or control reportable cotton futures positions under Regulation 15.00(p)(1)(i), 17 C.F.R. § 15.00(p)(1)(i) (2016), are required to file CFTC Form 304 reports. Regulation 15.00(p)(1)(i), in relevant part, defines a reportable position as any open contract position that meets or exceeds the level set forth in Regulation 15.03, 17 C.F.R. § 15.03 (2016), in any one futures contract on any reporting market at the close of the market on any business day. For cotton futures positions, Regulation 15.03, 17 C.F.R. § 15.03 (2016), establishes 100 contracts as the reporting level.

For cotton merchants and dealers with reportable positions, "CFTC Form 304 reports showing the quantity of call cotton bought or sold on which the price has not been fixed, together with the respective futures on which the purchase or sale is based" must be filed. 17 C.F.R. § 19.02(a) (2016). Call cotton refers to "spot cotton bought or sold, or contracted for purchase or sale at a price to be fixed later based upon a specified future." 17 C.F.R. § 19.02(a) (2016). Each CFTC Form 304 report must be "made weekly as of the close of business on Friday and filed . . . not later than the second business day following the date of the report." 17 C.F.R. § 19.02(b) (2016). See also CFTC Staff Advisory No. 13-14 ("Obligation of Reportable Market Participants to File CFTC Form 304 Reports for Call Cotton in a Timely Manner as Required by Commission Regulation 19.02") (DMO May 8, 2013).

By failing to file CFTC Form 304 reports as set forth above, Huafu, on approximately seventy-eight (78) occasions during the Relevant Period, violated Regulation 19.02. *See* 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016).

V.

#### FINDINGS OF VIOLATION

Based on the foregoing, the Commission finds that, during the Relevant Period, Respondent violated Regulation 19.02, 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016).

VI.

#### **OFFER OF SETTLEMENT**

Respondent has submitted the Offer in which it, without admitting or denying the findings and conclusions herein:

- A. Acknowledges receipt of service of this Order;
- B. Admits the jurisdiction of the Commission with respect to all matters set forth in this Order and for any action or proceeding brought or authorized by the Commission based on violation of or enforcement of this Order;
- C. Waives:
  - 1. The filing and service of a complaint and notice of hearing;
  - 2. A hearing;
  - 3. All post-hearing procedures;
  - 4. Judicial review by any court;
  - 5. Any and all objections to the participation by any member of the Commission's staff in the Commission's consideration of the Offer;

- 6. Any and all claims that it may possess under the Equal Access to Justice Act, 5 U.S.C. § 504 (2012) and 28 U.S.C. § 2412 (2012), and/or the rules promulgated by the Commission in conformity therewith, Part 148 of the Commission's Regulations, 17 C.F.R. §§ 148.1-30 (2016), relating to, or arising from, this proceeding;
- 7. Any and all claims that it may possess under the Small Business Regulatory Enforcement Fairness Act of 1996, Pub. L. No. 104-121, §§ 201-253, 110 Stat. 847, 857-868 (1996), as amended by Pub. L. No. 110-28, § 8302, 121 Stat. 112, 204-205 (2007), relating to, or arising from, this proceeding; and
- 8. Any claims of Double Jeopardy based on the institution of this proceeding or the entry in this proceeding of any order imposing a civil monetary penalty or any other relief;
- D. Stipulates that the record basis on which this Order is entered shall consist solely of the findings contained in this Order to which Respondent has consented in the Offer; and
- E. Consents, solely on the basis of the Offer, to the Commission's entry of this Order that:
  - 1. Makes findings by the Commission that Respondent violated Regulation 19.02, 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016);
  - 2. Orders Respondent to cease and desist from violating Regulation 19.02, 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016);
  - 3. Orders Respondent to pay a civil monetary penalty in the amount of two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000), plus post-judgment interest;
  - 4. Orders Respondent to comply with the conditions and undertakings consented to in the Offer and as set forth in Part VII of this Order.

Upon consideration, the Commission has determined to accept the Offer.

#### VII.

#### **ORDER**

### Accordingly, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

- A. Respondent shall cease and desist from violating Regulation 19.02, 17 C.F.R. § 19.02 (2016).
- B. Respondent shall pay a civil monetary penalty in the amount of two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) ("CMP Obligation") within ten (10) days of the date of the entry of this Order. If the CMP Obligation is not paid in full within ten (10) days of the date of entry of this Order, then post-judgment interest shall accrue on the CMP Obligation beginning on the date of entry of this Order and shall be determined by using

the Treasury Bill rate prevailing on the date of entry of this Order pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1961 (2012).

Respondent shall pay the CMP Obligation by electronic funds transfer, U.S. postal money order, certified check, bank cashier's check, or bank money order. If payment is to be made other than by electronic funds transfer, then the payment shall be made payable to the Commodity Futures Trading Commission and sent to the address below:

If payment is to be made by electronic funds transfer, Huafu shall contact Nikki Gibson or her successor at the above address to receive payment instructions and shall fully comply with those instructions. Huafu shall accompany payment of the CMP Obligation with a cover letter that identifies the paying Huafu and the name and docket number of this proceeding. Huafu shall simultaneously transmit copies of the cover letter and the form of payment to: (1) Chief Financial Officer, Commodity Futures Trading Commission, Three Lafayette Centre, 1155 21st Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20581; and (2) Deputy Director, Division of Enforcement, Commodity Futures Trading Commission, 140 Broadway, 19<sup>th</sup> Floor, New York, New York 10005.

- C. Respondent and its successors and assigns shall comply with the following conditions and undertakings set forth in the Offer:
  - 1. Public Statements: Respondent agrees that neither it nor any of its successors and assigns, agents or employees under its authority or control shall take any action or make any public statement denying, directly or indirectly, any findings or conclusions in this Order or creating, or tending to create, the impression that this Order is without a factual basis; provided, however, that nothing in this provision shall affect Respondent's: (i) testimonial obligations; or (ii) right to take legal positions in other proceedings to which the Commission is not a party. Respondent and its successors and assigns shall undertake all steps necessary to ensure that all of its agents and/or employees under its authority or control understand and comply with this agreement.
  - 2. <u>Partial Satisfaction</u>: Respondent understands and agrees that any acceptance by the Commission of any partial payment of Respondent's CMP Obligation shall not be deemed a waiver of its obligation to make further payments pursuant to this

- Order, or a waiver of the Commission's right to seek to compel payment of any remaining balance.
- 3. <u>Change of Address/Phone</u>: Until such time as Respondent satisfies in full its CMP Obligation as set forth in this Consent Order, Respondent shall provide written notice to the Commission by certified mail of any change to its telephone number and mailing address within ten (10) calendar days of the change.
- 4. <u>Undertakings</u>: Respondent will undertake (i) to adopt and maintain internal controls that are reasonably designed to ensure that the agents and employees under its authority and control comply fully with Regulation 19.02, 17 C.F.R § 19.02 (2016), and other CFTC filing requirements, including but not limited to designating a specific individual or individuals with responsibility for filing CFTC Form 304, (ii) to provide its employees with training to ensure future compliance with CFTC requirements, and (iii) to back file the CFTC Forms 304 that previously should have been filed with the Commission.

The provisions of this Order shall be effective as of this date.
